By the end of the 2015-2016 school year, Silver Crest Elementary will increase the number of students reading and writing at or above grade level by 5%.

Academic Areas

- Reading
- Writing

Measurements

This is the measurement identified in the plan to determine if the goal was reached.

Progress will be measured by DIBELS, PALS, SRI, Guided Reading levels and SAGE.

Please show the before and after measurements and how academic performance was improved.

The following data is listed as the percentage of students who are on or above grade level in the following assessments. They are listed, beginning of year and then end of year. DIBELS 67%-66%, SRI 52%-69%, Guided Reading levels 79%-82%. DIBELS dropped 1% while SRI and Guided Reading both saw growth in 17% and 3%.

SAGE Language Arts proficiency percentage for 14-15 school year was 39.4% while the 15-16 school year was 39.8, so we experienced a small amount of overall growth.

Silver Crest Elementary will hire reading aides to work with on, or below level, students in grades K-6 to provide Tier II literacy interventions. The reading aides have been trained in and are using the "My Sidewalks" program as well as "Success Makers'. We will be provide 10 hours of Teacher Effectiveness professional development to all teachers at the beginning of the year. The Teacher Effectiveness Training will provide teachers strategies for classroom management and student engagement, increasing the amount of time teachers will be able to spend in Tier I instruction, which will increase student learning in all academic areas. In addition, money will be used to pay for substitute teachers to cover classes (2 days for each teacher) while they engage in professional development and PLCs. Both result in more targeted Tier 1 classroom instruction leading to fewer students needing intervention support in language arts and math.

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Silver Crest Elementary provided 10 hours of Teacher Effectiveness professional development to all teachers at the start of the 15-16 school year. By the end of the 2015-2016 school year, Silver Crest Elementary will increase the number of students proficient (70% or higher) in math by 2%.

Academic Areas

Mathematics

Progress will be measured by Jordan School District Math Benchmark tests and SAGE.

Please show the before and after measurements and how academic performance was improved.

SAGE scores were the only measure assessed to measure this goal. The first percentage is from 14-15 school year and the second percentage is from the 15-16 school year. Third grade went from 43%-61% proficient. Fourth grade went from 44%-34% proficient. Fifth grade went from 40%-44% proficient and Sixth grade went from 38%-40% proficient. Overall, Silver Crest went from 41.4%-44.9%.

Silver Crest Elementary will be provide 10 hours of Teacher Effectiveness professional development to all teachers at the beginning of the year. The Teacher Effectiveness Training will provide teachers strategies for classroom management and student engagement, increasing the amount of time teachers will be able to spend in Tier I instruction, which will increase student learning in all academic areas. We will begin Comprehensive Mathematics Instruction (CMI) professional development in the spring of the 2015-2016 school year. CMI will provide all teachers with targeted professional development in math, math pedagogy and lesson study. This will be a three-year implementation process. Each year Silver Crest will need to fund 8,000-10,000 dollars (1/3) of the training costs. We have received a grant to cover the other 2/3 of the cost. In addition, money will be used to pay for substitute teachers to cover classes (2 days for each teacher) while they engage in professional development and PLCs. Both result in more targeted Tier 1 classroom instruction leading to fewer students needing intervention support in language arts and math.

Silver Crest Elementary provided 10 hours of Teacher Effectiveness professional development to all teachers at the beginning of the year. The Teacher Effectiveness Training provided teachers strategies for classroom management and student engagement, increasing the amount of time teachers would spend in Tier I instruction, which increased student learning in all academic areas.

Given our school need to really focus on and develop language arts proficiency and growth, Silver Crest decided to not proceed with the Comprehensive Mathematics Instruction. The money budgeted was carry over.

There is a substantial carryover due to Silver Crest determining not to continue Comprehensive Mathematics Instruction PD for teachers and two of our literacy aides were paid out of a different budget.

If Silver Crest receives additional funding we will examine current school data to determine our highest need. At that time money will be allocated to to purchase additional aides to support student achievement, professional development opportunities for teachers, English as a Second Language Endorsements for teachers, substitutes to cover classes for extended PLC meetings, additional time for technology support, or to purchase additional materials to support classroom teachers or aides. We would also use an increased distribution to help cover the cost of our continued Comprehensive Mathematics Instruction professional development.
